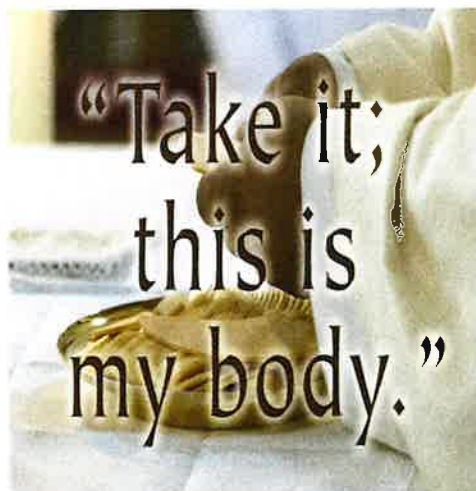

Thursday: St. Norbert, Bishop (founded the Premonstratensians or "Norbertines", which, today, number about 1,125 members; archbishop of Magdeburg; strong supporter of Church reform and evangelization; devoted to the Holy Eucharist.)

Friday: THE MOST SACRED HEART OF JESUS Christ offered himself for us. May his love dwell in our hearts. From his wounded side flowed blood and water, the fountain of salvation for all who believe. Oh the depth of the love of Christ who heals and forgives!

POPE FRANCIS – 60 MINUTES INTERVIEW. May 20, 2024. FR. KELLY

In his first in-depth interview with a U.S. broadcast network, Pope Francis addressed a wide range of topics, including the war in Ukraine, antisemitism, and U.S. immigration policy. His interview with Texas-born Nora O'Donnell of CBS's 60 Minutes was his first ever lengthy interview to an English-speaking channel. They met in his simple apartment in the Casa Sanctae Marthae (House of St. Martha) the guest house within the Vatican City State of which the Roman Pontiff is the Sovereign.

The pair were seated beneath a large image of Our Lady Undoer of Knots, a copy of painting in an 18th-century church in Augsburg, Germany, which the Pope first saw when he was a doctoral student there. The pope seemed very much at ease, joking with O' Donnell about the legacy of the Irish to the US.

The screening of this interview will confirm what his advisors have been saying – that his health is robust again despite trouble with his legs, that he is back to the fighting form they have come to expect. On last Saturday May 18, he visited Verona in northern Italy, the city of Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet, and seemed delighted to shake hands with pilgrims and clergy, even after being surrounded by an over-enthusiastic group of cloistered nuns as he sat in front of the altar in the city's cathedral. Later, he joked that he wanted to begin his speech by greeting the overjoyed nuns. *'Did you see how they all looked like that? Because in the cloister, in the enclosure, there is no loss of joy. There is joy. And they are good. They never gossip, never, never. They are good. Thank you, sisters.'* For pope-watchers, the comment is a return to one of Francis' most personal criticisms of us clergy, gossiping. He once accused his cardinals of being 'murderers' because they sharpen their tongues into daggers and stab others in the back with their gossip.

In the Cathedral of St. Zeno in Verona, The Pope returned to another theme that has been a hallmark of his pontificate, and a constant thorn in the side of his critics. He asked the priests in the congregation, *"please, forgive everything, forgive everything"*. He asked that they not interrogate people who come to confession too much, reminding us priests that we are often the ones who do not understand what people are trying to say. *"If you are not capable at that moment of understanding, go ahead: the Lord has understood. But please, do not torture the penitents"*. My personal adage on this matter is *"If you must err, err on the side of Charity."*

Throughout the interview with CBS, the Pope reiterates a third pillar of his preaching since his election, that the Church must go beyond race, color, ethnicity, sexual orientation or any other border. He repeated his plea to priests and laity to welcome everyone who approaches them without judgment. The Church doors must be open to

Blessing of all Sinners

When asked for a comment on “Fiducia Supplicans,” the controversial declaration issued in December 2023 that includes guidelines on the blessing of same-sex couples, Pope Francis explained yet again that it did not allow blessings of “the union” but of “each person.”

“What I allowed was not to bless the union,” the pope said. “That cannot be done because that is not the sacrament. I cannot. The Lord made it that way, ... But to bless each person, yes. The blessing is for everyone. For everyone. To bless a homosexual-type union, however, goes against the given right, against the law of the church. But to bless each person, why not? The blessing is for all. Some people were scandalized by this. But why? Everyone! Everyone!” “Homosexuality is a human fact,”

US opposition to his authority

When asked about some “conservative bishops in the United States that oppose your new efforts to revisit teachings and traditions.” Pope Francis defined conservatism as a “suicidal attitude”.

“You use the adjective ‘conservative’. That is to say, a conservative is one who sticks to something and does not want to see anything else. It is a suicidal attitude. Because one thing is to take tradition into account, to take into account situations from the past, but another is to be closed inside a dogmatic box.”

This comment should come as no surprise from the Argentine pope whose experiences in his own country make him wary of those who use the word ‘conservative’.

The Plight of Children in War zones.

O’Donnell did ask Pope Francis about the children of Gaza ahead of the Catholic Church’s inaugural World Children’s Day May 25-26, an observance instituted by the Vatican’s Dicastery for Culture and Education. He told her that he phones the only Catholic left in Gaza every evening and speaks to various parishioners.

He said that many of the Ukrainian children who come to the Vatican “*don't know how to smile ... they have forgotten how to smile. And that is very painful.*”

O'Donnell asked the pope how to address international division over the Israel-Hamas war, which has sparked big protests on college campuses and growing antisemitism.

“All ideology is bad. And antisemitism is an ideology, and it is bad. Any ‘anti’ is always bad. You can criticize one government or the other, the government of Israel, the Palestinian government. You can criticize all you want, but not ‘anti’ a people. Neither anti-Palestinian nor antisemitic. No. ... I pray a lot for peace. And also suggest, Please, stop. Negotiate.”

Human Migration

“Migration is something that makes a country grow. They say that you Irish migrated and brought the whiskey, and that the Italians migrated and brought the mafia... [laugh] It's a joke. Don't take it badly. But, migrants sometimes suffer a lot. They suffer a lot.”

O'Donnell also asked Pope Francis for his thoughts on the state of Texas' efforts to shutter Annunciation House, a Catholic nonprofit sheltering migrants at the U.S.-Mexico border.

“That is madness. Sheer madness. To close the border and leave them there, that is madness. ... The migrant has to be received. Thereafter you see how you are going to deal with him. Maybe you have to send him back, I don't know, but each case ought to be considered humanely.”

Indifference to the Plight of Others

Recalling Pope Francis' July 2013 visit to Lampedusa -- the Italian island to which thousands of migrants have fled, with thousands more perishing while crossing the Mediterranean -- O'Donnell asked Pope Francis to speak about “the globalization of indifference.”

“People wash their hands! There are so many Pontius Pilates on the loose out there ... who see what is happening, the wars, the injustice, the crimes ... (They say), ‘That's OK, that's OK’ and wash their hands. ... That is what happens when the heart hardens ... and becomes indifferent. .. Please, we have to get our hearts to feel again, ...

We cannot remain indifferent in the face of such human dramas. The globalization of indifference is a very ugly disease. Very ugly.”

Surrogate Motherhood

In a particularly poignant moment in the interview, O’Donnell asked Pope Francis about the church’s rejection of surrogacy, saying she knows women who are cancer survivors for whom the practice has become “the only hope” for having a child.

Pope Francis reaffirmed church teaching on the point, saying that surrogacy has sometimes “become a business, and that is very bad.” He also said that for infertile women, “the other hope is adoption,” and stressed that every case deserved attention.

“In regard to surrogate motherhood, in the strictest technical sense of the term, no, it cannot happen. Sometimes surrogacy has become a business, and that is very bad. It is very bad. ... The other hope is adoption. I would say that in each case the situation should be clearly considered, considered medically and then morally. I believe in these cases there is a general rule, but you have to go into each case in particular to assess the situation, as long as the moral principle is not skirted.”

The pope commended O’Donnell for her sensitivity toward people that “*in some cases (surrogacy) is the only chance,*” saying with a warm smile, “*It shows that you feel these things very deeply. Thank you.*”

O’Donnell, in turn, said the pope has inspired hope among many “*because you have been more open and accepting perhaps than any other previous leaders of the church.*”

The Church doors must be open to EVERYONE

Reiterating a cry he issued at World Youth Day 2023 in Lisbon, Pope Francis said that the church is open to “*everyone, everyone, everyone.*” “*Todos, todos, todos*”.

“The Gospel is for everyone,” he emphasized. “*If the church places a customs officer at the door, that is no longer the church of Christ.*”

The Knights of Columbus Council 15174 at Holy Spirit Catholic Church, Holly Lake Ranch, completed its 8th annual baby shower event. Holy Spirit parishioners contributed items required by babies and toddlers such as diapers, baby wipes, clothes, toys, blankets, portable cribs, car seats, and monetary contributions. For the 5th year the Knights supported the Building Blocks Ministry of Living Alternatives in Tyler (livingalternativestx.org); which offers practical help to young parents that encourages and renews hope for the future during and after periods of unplanned pregnancies. It is a unique earn-while-you-learn program where young moms and dads earn points for going to doctor appointments, attending parenting classes, and meeting with parenting mentors. Baby items are not given to the individuals; they must purchase the items with accumulated points. The Building Blocks Ministry also provides free pregnancy testing and free sonograms. This year, items valued at over \$2200 were collected by the Knights which were donated to Building Blocks Ministry.

Brief History of the Knights of Columbus

Late-19th century Connecticut was marked by the growing prevalence of fraternal benefit societies, hostility toward Catholic immigrants and dangerous working conditions in factories that left many families fatherless. Recognizing a vital, practical need in his community, Father Michael J. McGivney, the 29-year-old assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church in New Haven, Conn., gathered a group of men at his parish on Oct. 2, 1881. He proposed establishing a lay organization, the goal of which would be to prevent Catholic men from entering secret societies whose membership was antithetical to Church teaching, to unite men of Catholic faith and to provide for the families of deceased members.

As a symbol that allegiance to their country did not conflict with allegiance to their faith, the organization's members took as their patron Christopher Columbus — recognized as a Catholic and celebrated as the discoverer of America. Thanks to Father McGivney's persistence, the Knights of Columbus elected officers in February 1882 and officially assumed corporate status on March 29.

In addition to the Order's stated benefits, Catholic men were drawn to the Knights because of its emphasis on serving one's Church, community and family with virtue. Writing in *The Columbiad* in 1898, a year before he was elected supreme knight, Edward L. Hearn wrote that a Knight should live according to the virtues of loyalty, charity, courtesy and modesty, as well as "self-denial and careful respect for the feelings of others." Fraternity and patriotism were added to the Knights' founding principles of charity and unity in 1885 and 1900, respectively.
